1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 9 10 URGING THE FEDERAL NUCLEAR REGULATORY 11 COMMISSION TO DISAPPROVE THE REQUEST TO IMPORT 12 13 AND DISPOSE OF ITALIAN LOW-LEVEL RADIOACTIVE 14 WASTE IN THIS COUNTRY. 15 16 Whereas, the disposal of nuclear waste, low-level, as well as more toxic levels, has been an ongoing concern not only in South 17 Carolina but throughout the United States and around the world; 18 19 and 20 21 Whereas, the nuclear waste disposal facility in Barnwell, which has been in place for the past thirty-six years, has been a 22 contentious issue in this State for decades; and 23 24 25 Whereas, on the eve of the Barnwell facility closing to the nation this coming summer, the issue of importing and disposing of 26 27 foreign radioactive waste has arisen not only as a concern in South Carolina, but also as a concern facing the United States; and 28 29 30 Whereas, Foreign Solutions, Inc., of Utah, which, among other things, operates the Barnwell facility, is seeking approval from the 31 Nuclear Regulatory Commission to import twenty thousand tons of 32 Italian low-level radioactive waste through Charleston or New 33 Orleans for processing and disposal in the United States; and 34 35 Whereas, Italy, which currently stores its radioactive waste at 36 power plants and other sites throughout Italy, has no permanent 37 repository for this waste, has four closed nuclear power stations 38 and other nuclear facilities with low-level radioactive waste, and 39 40 for the past number of years has been unable to construct a waste disposal facility due to strong citizen opposition; and 41 42

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1 Whereas, due to having closed facilities and citizen opposition to construction of any new facilities, Italy reportedly has no nuclear 2 3 waste disposal plan and, according to a 2006 Italian report, is seeking assistance from other countries to manage different types 4 5 of nuclear waste; and 6 Whereas, the approval being sought from the United States for 7 8 disposition of twenty thousand tons of Italy's low-level waste, 9 which equates to approximately one million cubic feet, is allegedly a substantial percentage of the waste temporarily stored in Italy 10 11 and is believed to be unprecedented in the United States; and 12 13 Whereas, transporting tons of nuclear waste through South Carolina renews issues that our State has struggled with for 14 15 decades and raises concern over the potential danger to the people and environment of South Carolina; and 16 17 18 Whereas, having battled for years over the closure of the Barnwell facility, South Carolina must stand strong in its opposition to the 19 importation of foreign waste and the transportation of such waste 20 21 through this State; and 22 23 Whereas, importation of foreign waste is an issue that not only South Carolina must strongly resist, but also that the United States 24 must stand firmly against. As a nation we have our own 25 26 challenges in disposing of nuclear waste generated in this country, 27 and it is incumbent upon us to insist that other countries take 28 responsibility for the disposal of their own nuclear waste and not attempt to utilize the United States as a dumping ground; and 29 30 31 Whereas, the members of the South Carolina General Assembly 32 adamantly oppose the importation of low-level radioactive waste 33 from Italy and the transportation of this waste through South 34 Carolina for the disposal of such waste in this country. Now, 35 therefore, 36 Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives 37 38 concurring: 39 40 That the members of the South Carolina General Assembly, by this resolution, urge the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission to 41 disapprove the request to import and dispose of Italian low-level 42 43 radioactive waste in this country.

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2 Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to 3 each member of the South Carolina Congressional Delegation and

to Dale Klein, Chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission. 

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
